I have held a number of Managerial positions with London Underground and gained a wide range of experiences that will assist me as your Provincial Board member.

I was ordained in March 2003 as a Deacon of the Moravian Church at Queen's Park Bedford, by Bishop Geoffrey Birtill. At that time, I served the Bedford and Woodford Halse congregations under the guidance of Rev Hilary Smith who I also thank.

The call to become a non-stipendiary Provincial Board member, I recognise is a challenge. I ask that you continue to lift the whole Provincial Board in prayer and ask God to bestow us with wisdom.

I would like to conclude by thanking the members of Synod 2022 for electing me to join this long heritage of Brothers and Sisters who have served this Province for so many years.

Editorial What really matters?

The beginning of September officially marks the end of the summer and the more relaxed time of the summer holidays. There is less stress over July and August, fewer meetings, more time outside and more time for family and friends. Then September starts and so does the pressure.

And so much of that pressure seems to come from education with the new academic year beginning: pressure to get the children to school as well as doing everything else, pressure from homework, pressure as children leave home to go on to higher and further education. Some of us in churches can also feel apprehensive as August turns into September. It is the beginning of all the activity again, not just the regular cycle of worship but the additional groups for women and men, Bible Study and youth and children's groups of varying types.

Then leading up to harvest and Christmas the pace quickens as seasonal events and special services take place, and all of them needing planning and attendance and clearing up afterwards.

I am beginning to think that we should consider and appraise what we need to do and what we should be doing before we start again. COVID has brought this into sharper focus as this time we will be doing things in person for the first time in three years. There are fewer volunteers and folk are now three years older and some may not be so active.

Is going back to the default position of 'we have always done it this way', the best for a new time and outreach in a new world? The world has moved on and some are still trying to use what worked well in the 20th century, and we are nearly a quarter of the way through the 21st century. Our calling as Christians is to share the good news of Jesus and we just can't do that wrapped in last century's old newspapers.

I have no doubt that our communities need to hear about the saving love and grace of God shown through Jesus but are we really doing that at the moment? How do we make our organisation relevant and attractive to people in a time of great social distress with increasing general poverty?

This is not about bums on seats, it is about serving people as best we can, where they are. Perhaps we should strip it all down to what is essential in our Church life, worship in various forms and outreach, and look at how we do that and do it better. Then and only then look

at what else we should be doing and making that outward facing rather than inward facing because it pleases us and brings no risks and fear of failure.

Report from the 2022 Provincial Synod

Our first in-person Synod, since the COVID pandemic, was held at the Hayes Conference Centre in Swanwick, Derbyshire, from 14th July to 18th July 2022. It was a time of fellowship and conversation which Zoom cannot enable, and it was good to see people again in the flesh and share in meals and coffee together.

The opening service was led by Br Peter Gubi, and the preacher was Br Mikie Roberts who is a Moravian Minister serving at the World Council of Churches in Switzerland. The Synod was ably facilitated by Br Philip Cooper (Chair) and Sr Jane Carter (Vice-Chair) and was conducted in the usual orderly fashion. Bishop Joachim Kreusel was elected as President of the Synod and Bishop John McOwat was elected as Vice-President of Synod. There were Ministers and Deputies present from each congregation in the British Province, as well as Ecumenical and Unity guests. There were special sessions on 'Youth Work' and the 'Call to serve the Church'. In the 'Youth Work' session, our awareness of the needs of young people was heightened and some ideas were provided on how to include them more in the life of the Church; in the 'Call to serve the Church' session, we were made aware of the need for more ordained ministers (ten of our serving ministers, out of the current seventeen ministers, will be eligible for retirement in the next ten years!) and we were shown a video of Claire Maxwell, Jane Carter, Christine Emanuel and Michael Newman discussing their calls to ministry, which stimulated discussion on how we might encourage others to respond to God's call. Both sessions provided much food for thought. Reports were received on the work of each provincial committee, and memorials were received from various organisations within our province e.g., MWA, Men's Fellowship, YPMA, The Moravian Messenger, Diaspora, etc.

Proposals were passed: to determine a statement of inclusivity; to authorise the blessing of same-sex civil marriages and same-sex civil partnerships (providing that committees and congregation

councils give permission, and that Ministers are in agreement); and to further the implementation of arrangements that provide for interchangeability of ministry with the Church of Ireland. Proposals were also passed to determine working hours for ministers; to give provision for Lay members of PEC for when, or if, their term of office ends: to raise Choir House assessment; to give the Provincial Board the authority to make commercial decisions about Fulneck School if necessary; to change Moravian Union Investment Trustees to Moravian Union Investment Advisors; to determine ways of formally recognising ministers from other denominations into Moravian ministry; to determine the composition of the Provincial Youth and Children's Committee: to dissolve the World Mission Committee (as their work was duplicated elsewhere); to change how congregational representation at Synod is determined; and to seek not to immediately change advice on investments but allow a more gradual move towards Environmental. Social and Governance (ESG) investments due to the significant loss in income for the province that a faster rate of conversion would incur.

The highlight of Synod was the consecration of Br Jared Stephens as Presbyter. This was a lovely and moving service which was led by Bishop Joachim Kreusel. Br Livingstone Thompson was the preacher.

- Mission and Society Committee: Eunice Hoey and John Kilner (for four years) and Alan Holdsworth (for two years);
- Youth and Children's Committee: Rachel Hamilton, Laura Wood and Kieran Hopton (for four years) and Alishbha Khan (for two years);
- Faith and Order and Ecumenical Relations Committee: Susan Groves and Martin Smith (for four years) and Joy Raynor (for two years);
- Archive and Heritage Committee: Christopher Shorten (for four years) and Jayne Brewster (for two years);
- Moravian Union Investment Advisors: Graham Mallinson, John Cooper, Tony Harvey, Daniel Newman, Kenneth Evans and Norma Maynard;
- Advocatus Unitatis Fratrum in Anglia: Gillian Taylor;
- Secretarius Unitatis Fratrum in Anglia: Robert Hopcroft;
- Chairperson for Synod 2024: Philip Cooper:
- Vice-Chairperson for Synod 2024: Jane Carter:
- Reserve Chairperson for Synod 2024: Christine Emanuel.

Appreciation was shown to Sr Joy Raynor who is retiring as Provincial Youth and Children's Officer (although she will continue as National Safeguarding Lead for the Moravian Church). Appreciation was also shown to Br Peter Gubi for his work on the Provincial Board. We thanked all of those who served the Synod and looked after our needs (Sally Ann Johnston, Clerk; Rachel Hamilton, Assistant Clerk; Chris Drake, Steward; Sue Selby, Minute Secretary; Susan Quildan-Foreman, Teller; Lindsey Newens, Admin; Lorraine Parsons, Technician) - without whom Synod could not happen. Voting was carried out electronically (with some success) and by other more traditional methods. Overall, it was a lovely Synod,

difficult but largely gracious discussion, and good humour.

The plan to start organising an All India Moravian Youth Meet in Leh began in November 2019. But the pandemic stopped us from hosting it for the following two years.

However, I still believed that God would surely fulfill the vision of the Youth Meet. Truly, by God's grace the vision began to take shape slowly by slowly in November 2021. That same month we formed a Planning Team and began to meet from time to time. The objectives of the event were to facilitate the interaction and fellowship among the young people of various congregations across India, and to discuss the challenges faced by young people and provide quidance to live righteously.

We thank God that He had prepared so many people to help us in one or the other way. With the financial support of the BMB and Sr Maureen Colbert, most of the youths from other parts of India could travel to the Meet. A big 'thanks' to the BMB and Sr Maureen. After much anticipation, on 30th June nearly 90 youths arrived in Leh, including those who lived locally, who attended. We are grateful Sr Naomi and Br David Sonam for generously donating their Snow View Hotel's rooms for five days to accommodate the youths from outside Ladakh.

They were welcomed with the presentation of the ceremonial 'Khatakh' by the Leh Moravian youth and we received warm greetings from Sr Roberta, the chair of the BMB, Br Joachim Kreusel and Br Paul Holdsworth via Zoom. The event was opened by a worship service and sermon given by Rev Ricky Medom who preached on the sub-theme 'A Call to a Righteous Living in a Challenging World', at Snow View Hotel. His message was simple yet touching. We were glad to have Rev Ricky Medom and Mrs Virginia Medom - they have been ministering amongst the Naga students in Delhi for over 30 years.

On Friday morning the first session began with the preaching of Rev Ricky Medom, followed by Rev Thsespal Kundan presenting the history of Unitas Fratrum in an interactive and interesting way covering all the major events of it's history. Br Nathaniel Gengmei, a student pastor in Assam Bible Study, held a Bible Study in which he challenged the youths to be excellent even at such a young age and to live up to the callings. Later that evening a musical event kindly held in Br Tadbar Joldan's field provided a blissful and very special evening with choirs from

different regions, solo, duet, group singings, and dances. It was so refreshing after the long tiring day and the evening ended with a delicious dinner sponsored by Br Nawang Shunu.

The first half of Saturday was similar to the previous day starting with Rev Ricky's sermon followed by another session from Rev Thsespal about Unitas Fratrum's practices and its structures. After lunch Br Chandra Prakash, who works with Teen Challenge corporations, spoke on 'Relevant Issues faced by Today's Youths'. In the next session, Sr Sherilyn Deldan, Sr Lydia Sonam, Br Bir Bahadur, Sr Christiana Gengmei and Br Sunderman Tamang presented their congregational historical backgrounds and ministries. It was truly exciting in the evening as different teams cooked their respective regional foods and we got to taste the different cuisines from other regions. Thanks to Br Yonah Paljor who bore the expense of both lunch and dinner.

It was amazing to see many people gathered for service on Sunday morning. Again Rev Ricky preached a straightforward and heart-warming sermon. We were also blessed by the northeastern choir as they sang to the delight of the audience. The service concluded and we rejoiced with the celebration of Holy Communion led by Rev Thsespal Kundan conducted in Ladakhi with translations into English and Hindi.

I would also like to extend my heartfelt gratitude to the Leh Committee for their financial and moral support; to Moravian Welfare Society and the Principal of Moravian Mission School; to Br Odpal George who supported the trip to Pangong Lake for the youths, especially the youths from outside Ladakh; to Peter George who funded all the refreshments throughout the Meet; furthermore, a 'thank you' to all individuals for their contributions: Br Elihud George, Sr Zhidey Kundan and Br Joseph Kundan's family, Sr Rachel Dendol, Sr Sumita Dana, Pastor Danish, Br Odpal Sonam, Sr Spalzes Wangmo and the Rajpur Moravian Congregation. Additionally, my sincere appreciation to the planning team members: Br Anub Paljor, Sr Sharon Sonam, Br Enoch Spalbar, Sr Lydia Sonam, Br Rohit Amos and Br Thomas Paljor, and to all the local youths for their active corporation with the organisation of the event and to all the youths as a whole for the active participations throughout the Meet.

Over the years it has become apparent that Youth and Children's work and Safeguarding, although connected, are two distinct areas of work. She has worked diligently on preparing policies and used this knowledge and expertise to great effect ecumenically too. It was an absolute delight to be present with brothers and sisters in Christ at the British Provincial Synod. Thank you for your warm welcome. I was honoured to be invited as a Unity representative from the America North Province. From the outset, I was greeted by Br David Howarth at London Heathrow and delivered to the Hayes Conference Centre. David and I had met one another at a synod of the European Continental Province. I had met other ministers and deputies at the 2017 Unity Mission Conference held in Cape Town, South Africa. And, of course, I have worked closely, first with Br Bob Hopcroft, and more recently with Sr Roberta Hoey, on Unity Board. One of the great gifts of the

Moravian Unity is getting to know brothers and sisters at various gatherings around the Unity and then meeting them again at a later time. The other blessing is meeting new people with the assurance that I will see them again in another Moravian setting. I experienced much joy and laughter, hearty singing, and wonderful fellowship over meals and after hours.

Your synod, with about 48 voting members, is much smaller than my experience at the America North synod, where we have about 250 members. Your gathering is more like a family reunion, characterised by caring relationships, deep respect for one another, and a collective desire to seek

and follow God's will. I saw evidence of all three charisms throughout synod. You know one another well and can be honest in your opinions, without acrimony. You express deep love and respect for one another by attending to the varying perspectives among you as you listen for God's leading.

Synod started with a challenge by Br Mikie Roberts to take risks, to tend to the seeds of faith that are planted in God's realm. Throughout synod you demonstrated that willingness to risk not for your own sakes, but for the sake of the gospel. Sunday evening's consecration and Holy Communion service offered another challenge - to remember the urgency of the gospel and remain boldly prophetic in the face of injustice.

I was deeply humbled by the commitment of your clergy and lay people who work tirelessly to proclaim the gospel and take care of children, worship, church buildings, properties and finances - all to further your witness in the world. You asked hard

questions of one another, not to tear down, but to pursue the best, and build up the Body of Christ. I was excited to learn about Project 32 and pray that it brings about a new spirit of experimentation and pioneering in every congregation and community. I anticipate with hope the celebration in 2032 as Moravians around the world celebrate the 300th anniversary of sending missionaries out from Herrnhut to bring the gospel throughout the world. I can't wait to hear stories of how the congregations in your Districts found new ways to bless their neighbours and bring about a better world.

Your statement of inclusivity is a powerful testimony of your commitment to welcome all in your midst. I am confident that the words on paper will become living invitations by your members to all those who may wonder if they are truly welcome. Your statement shouts an emphatic - yes! Similarly, your statement allowing the blessing of same sex civil marriages and partnerships, stands as a commitment to justice and theological hospitality to couples that wonder if the church loves them.

One of the gifts of attending another province's synod is learning about customs, ideas, programs, and resources. Sr Joy Raynor shared the

Safeguarding program with me - something that will better equip our province to protect our children and vulnerable adults. I was able to share some stewardship resources with members of your provincial board - and make connections to people in America.

Above all, I was reminded of the gift of the worldwide Unity and our ecumenical relationships. Approving the interchangeability of clergy with the Church of Ireland represents another big step toward Christ's prayer that we all may be one. Being with you, the guests from the Czech and European Continental Provinces reminded me that we are all on a journey together, seeking to bear witness to God's amazing love for all the world.

Synod 2022:

Unpredictable Certainty

- a reflection from a Synodal of their first time at Swanwick

The theme of Synod was set by our opening distinguished speaker Rev Dr Mikie Roberts, a Moravian minister representing us all on the World Council of Churches. It was a profound and meaningful address, and the two words 'Unpredictable Certainty' resonated with me throughout the five days.

Was it indeed a predictable or unpredictable certainty that I would enjoy Synod so much? As a first time synodal, my initial unease was assuaged by the familiar and inspiring face of Br John McOwat. Finding him initially at Reception ensured a warm welcome and a seamless means of meeting new Moravian friends as, of course, everyone knows Br John!

My overriding memory remains the joy of the opening service and of the Synod Communion and Consecration service for Br Jared Stephens, and indeed, the zeal with which we all relished the hymns, prayers and graces which heralded the opening and conclusion of each session. Our bishops chose the hymns with great glee and relevance to the topics discussed, and the chairpersons, clerks and stewards ensured that the schedule of business proceeded with just the right amount of timeliness, consideration and humour.

The enthusiasm of the laughter and chatter each time we arrived and departed from the Conference Hall was testimony to the fellowship and fun that was celebrated by us all.

There was of course serious work to be done, and the proposals covering such a variety of topics whether ecumenical, fiscal, national or international were especially enlightening for a firsttime attendee. The reports and memorials from so many important committees and hardworking, dedicated Moravians demonstrated the broad extent of our church and our influence. It was with a sense of pride and excitement that landmark proposals were discussed and passed, especially those enhancing our relationship with the Church of Ireland, and the opportunity for a service of blessing to be offered under certain agreed procedures for civil marriages and same sex partnerships. In the words of the visiting Church of Ireland Bishop, Rt Rev Michael Burrows, 'may we travel happily together'.

It was particularly encouraging to hear of new avenues and initiatives to grow our membership and ministry for the years ahead, with a resurgence ahead for youth work and events planned for the coming year. Indeed, the wisdom and commitment shown by our younger synodals was also most refreshing, and their confidence in their proposals and their lasting contribution to Synod was outstanding.

Whilst the conference centre itself, the location, food and staff were all first class - not forgetting the welcoming goats and Canadian geese! It was with great pride and sincerity that we were able to discuss our church and our mission with other ecumenical groups that we encountered at Swanwick from time to time.

As Fulneck's deputy, it was enlightening to meet so many colleagues with direct and indirect associations with our church and school. It was a testimony to our recently retired master baker Ron Davey that so many recalled their visits to Fulneck over the years for Lovefeast and Communion, and Ron's buns remain the best ever!

Whilst there are too many names to mention, my thanks go initially to our Fulneck membership who elected me as their synodal. The visiting and distinguished speakers, members of the PEC Board, serving and retired ministers, fellow synodals from far and wide that I met for the first time and also those from West Yorkshire who were so encouraging and helpful everyone truly demonstrates that we are all equal as well as committed and proud of our church and heritage.

It was also important to attend all the sessions, and anyone failing to attend the 8am morning prayers and Bible Study would have missed the delightful and provocative tale of Mr Mouse. We also discussed the important theme of hope, and later, the meaning and derivation of our own names.

Whilst Br Mikie Roberts reflected wisely on the theme of unpredictable certainty, I would have anticipated a predictable uncertainty for myself in terms of how readily I might have approached and enjoyed Synod. Thanks to everyone involved for their professionalism, expertise, encouragement and support, it turned out undoubtedly to be an unpredictable certainty that Synod 2022 for me was an unforgettable and most fulfilling experience. I would encourage all Moravian novice members

to contemplate being nominated by your congregations for Synod 2024, as the knowledge gained, friendships made and fellowship sustained will remain with me for many years to

Celebrating Heritage Open Day at Fetter Lane

To celebrate our 275th anniversary, Fetter Lane will participate in Open House London on Saturday and Sunday. 16th and 17th September with Moravian Close open from 1pm to 5pm on each day. Open House started in 1992 to promote public appreciation of building design and architecture in the capital.

As well as giving an historical overview of the Moravians in London, past and present, visitors will learn about the site's evolution and special features including the renovation of the Tudor wall surrounding God's Acre and the restoration of the Gillick Pageant, a set of heraldic shields showing the ownership of the estate from Sir Thomas More in 1524 to Sir Hans Sloane in 1737. Sculptors Mary and Ernest Gillick lived and worked in the Close from 1914 to the 1964. Refreshments will be served.

Fetter Lane Moravian Church is located at 381 King's Road, London SW10 OLP. Please note that there is no parking inside the Close but pay and display can be found in the immediate area.

Weston Free Church (Moravian), Bath



Weston Free Church (Moravian) is located in the village of Upper Weston, on the western outskirts of the Georgian city of Bath. The church grew from the destruction of the Fetter Lane Moravian Chapel in London, during the blitz in May 1941. Money obtained from the war compensation fund was used to build the new Church in Bath and a brick rescued from the ruins of Fetter Lane is still displayed, commemorating this gift, on 10th February 1957.

Initially, the hall was built and used as a Church and Sunday School and three years later, in November 1955, a service was held to celebrate the laying of the foundation stones of the Church building. Villagers were offered the opportunity to sponsor a brick, by purchasing a book of tickets priced at 3d each. The opening ceremony and dedication were performed on Saturday, 13th October 1956. The Church was a focus for village family worship and a contemporary photograph shows around 60 children in the Sunday School. The Church has continued to serve the area and held its 50th Anniversary celebrations in 2003, which included a Civic Service, attended by the mayor and previous ministers.

However, over time, deterioration in the fabric of the building, heating system and a sustained water leak from the tower roof, meant difficult decisions had to be made about what could be done to protect and manage the futureproofing of the Church. After a long period of discussion and consultation, an innovative plan was created that would repair and improve the structure of the building, whilst allowing a major alteration of space and creation of new rooms and opportunities.

Initially a new kitchen and toilets with disabled access were constructed as part of the hall building and the wooden pews were removed from the Church. The heating system was improved, the roof and waterproofing of the tower was completed, and work was ready to begin on the internal structure of the Church - and then in early 2020 the COVID-19 pandemic struck! This was obviously a very worrying and distressing time for the whole country, but after our initial despair that services and lettings could not take place, it was recognised that this time could still be used productively by the craftsmen involved.

The renovation has produced a spectacular change of space and facilities. By removing the choir stalls, steps and dais at the

front of the Church and bringing the back wall forward, there is now room for a corridor behind the wall, containing another suite of toilets, utility room and office. Opposite is a large storage area, with stairs to a room above for the Boys Brigade. The old vestry and rooms were combined to make a second kitchen, with access into the Church. A new sound and hearing loop system has also been installed.

Following a water leak which flooded the Church parquet flooring, blocks were subsequently replaced and polished and everything was ready in time for our opening celebrations and service in September 2021. The mayor attended and it was lovely to welcome everyone to explore the new space, followed by cream teas and displays by the organisations who meet at the church.

Our congregation is small, but enthusiastic and there have been some changes in the Church groups using the buildings since the pandemic period. Sadly, we have no children in Junior Church at present, but the Boys Brigade is strong and as we now have two separate spaces available for letting, a new weekly Church Toddler Group meets at the same time as the 'Love Weston Cafe', a joint church initiative, which serves affordable food to local people in the hall. We have good links with neighbouring churches and regularly meet for shared services and events. The MWA group plans to meet in person again and the Lunch Club is now run by a family business on a not-for-profit basis. Our lettings to local groups have increased and include, Karate, Yoga, Fitness, Townswomen's Guild, Brownies, a Brass Band, Singing, Drama, a Parkinson's support Group and private parties.

Our next project for the building is to install Wi-Fi and we also hope to produce a new Church Website. Initiatives for the local community that have proved popular recently are our Charity Quiz nights, and the Family Fun Evenings for families with school aged children, which include games activities and free refreshments. We are currently in the process of building a Community Garden in the Church grounds, offering a quiet space for people to sit and talk, or just relax.

A lot has changed since that gift of the Fetter Lane brick, and we thank God for His steadfast guidance and support as we continue to worship and serve our community in His name.
